Textbooks: New, Used, or Download?

Your schedule is in place and now it's time to purchase textbooks. Sticker shock is about to come your way—have you priced textbooks lately? \$200 for one textbook is not unusual. So what's a student to do? Luckily there are choices available to help ease the financial burden of textbooks.

Amazon now offers new, used, and **Kindle textbooks**. Digital textbooks can be downloaded onto your PC, Mac, Kindle or other mobile device. With a rental minimum of 30 days, you can select the exact time frame needed for the textbook rental and have the option of extending time by daily increments if needed.

This format saves up to 80% off the retail price and allows you to keep your notes and highlighted information beyond the rental date.
